CHAPTER-I

INTRODUCTION

The Sikkim State Human Rights Commission was set up by the Government of Sikkim under the Protection of Human Rights Act, 1993 through a Gazette Notification No. 101/Home/2008 issued dated 18-10-2008 and it started functioning from 25th November, 2008 after Hon'ble Shri Justice Ajoy Nath Ray (Rtd.) took over as the first Chairperson of the Commission.

This Annual report of the Sikkim State Human Rights Commission covers the period from 1st April, 2024 to 31st March, 2025. This is the 11th Annual Report of the Commission.

The annual report of the Commission provides a description about the overall activities undertaken during the aforesaid period. It took cognizance on the complaints as well as Suo-Motu cognizance in other matters about occurrences hinting towards use of excessive force by police personnel in different areas of the State, violation of human rights etc.

For the last sixteen years, the Commission is serving the general public of the State by enforcing human rights of the general public, compensating those who have suffered due to violation of human rights and recommending departmental enquiry against the Government officials who violated human rights or showed negligence in preventing it. The Commission also engaged itself in awakening and encouraging people as to the means of protecting their human rights

CHAPTER- II

SALIENT FEATURES OF THE PROTECTION OF HUMAN RIGHTS ACT, 1993

Section 12 – Functions of the State Commission

The Commission shall perform all or any of the following functions, namely:-

- (a) inquire, Suo-Motu or on a petition presented to it by a victim or any person on his behalf (or on a direction or order of any courts), into complaint of-
 - (i) violation of human rights or abetment thereof; or
 - (ii) negligence in the prevention of such violation by a public servant;
- (b) intervene in any proceeding involving any allegation of violation of human rights pending before a court with the approval of such court;
- (c) visit, notwithstanding anything contained in any other law for the time being in force, any jail or other institution under the control of the State Government where persons are detained or lodged for purposes of treatment, reformation or protection, for the study of the living conditions of the inmates thereof and make recommendations thereon to the Government;
- (d) review the safeguards provided by or under the Constitution or any law for the time being in force for the protection of human rights and recommend measures for their effective implementation;
- (e) review the factor, including acts of terrorism, that inhibit the enjoyment of human rights and recommend appropriate remedial measure;
- (f) study treaties and other international instruments on human rights and make recommendations for their effective implementation;
- (g) undertake and promote research in the field of human rights;
- (h) spread human rights literacy among various section of society and promote awareness of the safeguards available for the protection of these rights through publications, the media, seminars and other available means;
- (i) encourage the efforts of non-governmental organizations and institutions working in the field of human rights;
- (j) such other functions as it may consider necessary for the protection of human rights.

Complaints not ordinarily entertainable under the Act:-

- i. illegible;
- ii. vague;
- iii. trivial, frivolous or pseudonymous;
- iv. any matter which is sub-judice or pending before a State Commission or any other Commission duly constituted under any law, for the time being in force;
- v. any matter after the expiry of one year from the date on which the act constituting violation of human rights is alleged to have been committed;

- vi. allegation not against any public servant;
- vii. allegation which does not make out any specific violation of human rights;
- viii. matter covered by a judicial verdict or decision of the State Commission;
- ix. the matter outside the purview of the State Commission on any other ground.

SECTION 13: POWERS RELATING TO INQUIRIES

- (1) The Commission shall, while inquiring into complaints under this Act, have all the powers of a civil courts trying a suit under the code of Civil Procedure, 1908 and in particular in respect of the following matters, namely:-
 - (a) Summoning and enforcing the attendance of witnesses and examining them on oath;
 - (b) Discovery and production of any document;
 - (c) Receiving evidence on affidavits;
 - (d) Requisitioning any public record or copy thereof from any court or office;
 - (e) Issuing Commissions for examination of witnesses or documents;
 - (f) Any other matter which may be prescribed.
- (2) The Commission shall have power to require any person, subject to any privilege which may be claimed by that person under any law for the time being in force, to furnish information on such points or matters as, in the opinion of the commission, may be useful for, or relevant to, the subject matter of the inquiry and any person so required shall be deemed to be legally bound to furnish such information within the meaning of section 176 and section 177 of the Indian Penal Code (now read as section 211 and section 212 of the Bharatiya Nyaya Sanhita, 2023).
- (3) The Commission or any other officer, not below the rank of a gazette Officer, specially authorized in this behalf by the Commission may enter any building or place where the Commission has reason to believe that any document relating to the subject matter of the inquiry may be found, and may seize any such document or take extracts or copies therefrom subject to the provisions of the section 100 of the Code of Criminal Procedure, 1973, (now read as section 103 of the Bharatiya Nagarik Suraksha Sanhita, 2023) in so far as it may be applicable.
- (4) The Commission shall be deemed to be a civil court and when any offence as is described in section 175, section 178, section 179, section 180 or section 228 of the Indian Penal code (now read as section 210, section 213, section 214, section 215, section 267 of the Bharatiya Nyaya Sanhita, 2023), is committed in the view or presence of the Commission, the Commission may, after recording the facts constituting the offence and the statement of the accused as provided for in the Code of Criminal Procedure, 1973 (now read as Bharatiya Nagarik Suraksha Sanhita, 2023), forward the case to a Magistrate having jurisdiction to try the same and the Magistrate to whom any such case is forwarded shall proceed to hear the complaint against the accused as if the case has been forwarded to him under 346 of the Code of Criminal Procedure, 1973 (now read as section 385 of the Bharatiya Nagarik Suraksha Sanhita, 2023).

(5) Every proceeding before the Commission shall be deemed to be a judicial proceeding within the meaning of section 193 and section 228, and for the purpose of section 196 of the Indian Penal Code (**now read as section 229 and 267 and 233 of the Bharatiya Nyaya Sanhita (BNS)**) and the Commission shall be deemed to be a civil court for all the purpose of section 195 and chapter XXVI of the Code of Criminal Procedure, 1973, (**now read as section 215 of the Bharatiya Nagarik Suraksha Sanhita, 2023 and Chapter XXVIII**).

(6) Where the Commission considers it necessary or expedient so to do, it may, by order, transfer any complaint filed or pending before it to the State Commission of the State from which the complaint arises, for disposal in accordance with the provisions of this Act;

Provided that no such complaint shall be transferred unless the same is one respecting which the State Commission has jurisdiction to entertain the same.

(7) Every complaint transferred under sub-section (6) shall be dealt with and disposed of by the State Commission as if it were a complaint initially filed before it.

SECTION 14- INVESTIGATION

(1) The Commission may, for the purpose of conducting any investigation pertaining to the inquiry, utilize the service of any officer or investigation agency of the Central Government or any State Government with the concurrence of the Central Government or any State Government, as the case may be.

(2) For the purpose of investigating into any matter pertaining to the inquiry, any officer or agency whose services are utilized under sub-section (1) may, subject to the direction and control of the Commission: -

(a) Summon and enforce the attendance of any person and examine him;

(b) Require the discovery and production of any document; and

(c) Requisition any public record or copy thereof from any office.

(3) The provisions of section 15 shall apply in relation to any statement made by a person before any officer or agency whose service are utilized under sub-section (1) as they apply in relation to any statement made by a person in the course of giving evidence before the Commission.

(4) The officer or agency whose services are utilized under sub-section (1) of section 14 shall investigate into any matter pertaining to the inquiry and submit a report thereon to the Commission within such period as may be specified by the Commission in this behalf.

(5) The Commission shall satisfy itself about the correctness of the facts stated and the conclusion, if any, arrived at in the report submitted to it under sub-section (4) of section 14 and for this purpose the Commission may make such inquiry (including the examination of the person or persons who conducted or assisted in the investigation) as it thinks fit

CHAPTER-III

PROCEDURE

SECTION 17: INQUIRY INTO COMPLAINTS

The Commission while inquiring into the complaints of violations of human rights may-

- (i) Call for the information or report from the Central Government or any State Government or any other authority or organization subordinate thereto within such time as may be specified by it:

Provided that-

- (a) if the information or report is not received within the time stipulated by the Commission, it may proceed to inquire into the complaint on its own;
 - (b) if, on receipt of information or report, the Commission is satisfied either that no further inquiry is required or that the required action has been initiated or taken by the concerned Government or authority, it may not proceed with the complaint and inform the complainant accordingly;
- (ii) without prejudice to anything contained in clause (i), if it considers necessary, having regard to the nature of the complaint, initiate an inquiry.

CHAPTER-IV

COMPOSITION AND FUNCTIONS

Chapter V of the Protection of Human Rights Act, 1993 (as amended up to date) deals with constitution of States Human Rights Commission.

COMPOSITION

The Commission comprises of a Chairperson and two Members. The Protection of Human Rights Act, 1993 lays down qualifications for appointment of the Chairperson and Members of the Commission.

COMPOSITION OF SIKKIM STATE HUMAN RIGHTS COMMISSION

Chairperson

**Who has been a (Chief Justice or a Judge) of a High Court
(Section 21 (2) (a) of Protection of Human Rights Act 1993)**

One Member who is, or has been a judge of High Court or District Judge in the state with a minimum of 7 years' experience as District Judge.

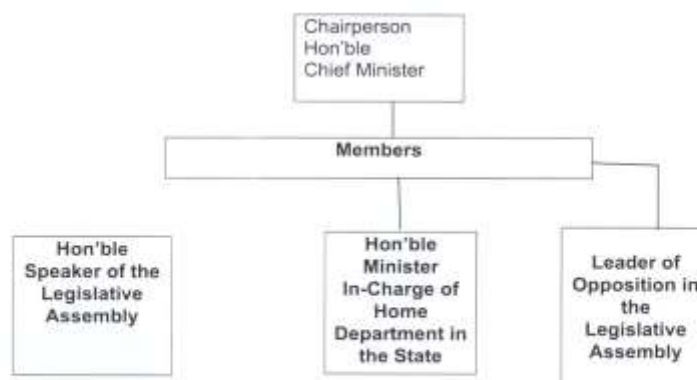
(Section 21(2)(b) of Protection of Human Rights Act, 1993)

One Member to be appointed from among persons having knowledge of or practical experience in matters relating to Human Rights.(Section 21(2) (c) of Protection of Human Rights Act, 1993)

CHAPTER-V
APPOINTMENT

The Parliament in its wisdom looking into the sensitivity and plousness of human rights was conscous to lay down strict norms for the appointment of Chairperson and the Members of the Commission. The statutory requirements relating to the qualifications of the Chairperson and Members of the Commission, as well as their selection by a high-level committee ensures a high degree of independence and credibility to the functions of the State Commission.

Selection Committee for Appointment of Chairperson and Members of Sikkim

As per section 24 (1) of the Protection of Human Rights Act 1993, (as amended by amendment Act of 2019), the tenure of the Chairperson of the Commission is for a term of three years from the date on which he/she enters upon his/her office or until he/she attains the age of seventy years, whichever is earlier, and shall be eligible for re-appointment.

CHAPTER-VII

BUDGET AND ACCOUNTS

CHAPTER-VIII

INTERNSHIP/TRAINING

Sub-Section (g) and (h) of Section 12 of Protection of Human Rights Act, 1993 give emphasis to promote research in the field of human rights and to spread human rights literacy among various sections of society and promote awareness of the safeguards available for the protection of these rights through publications, media, seminars and other available means.

During the period of this Annual Report, on the request of the Principal/Registrar of different Law colleges/Institutions 55 students have undergone Internship/training in the Sikkim State Human Rights Commission.

CHAPTER-IX

COMPLAINT RECEIVED/INSTITUTED/DISPOSED OF

During the period of Annual Report 2024-25 two new cases were filed before the Commission. There were five cases carried forward from previous year.

The details of pending cases as on 31st March, 2025, disposed of and new complaints received during the period of report are as under: -

1. Complaint Case No. 04 of 2020, Mr. Nawin Kiran Pradhan Vs. Superintendent of Police, Gangtok

The Complaint was filed by Mr. Nawin Kiran Pradhan, Advocate/Vice Convener, SSC on 15th June, 2020. The matter is regarding the brutal attack in broad daylight by unidentified goons against Mr. J.B Darnal, the victim.

The case has been registered as Complaint Case no. 04 of 2020.

The case is pending disposal.

2. Complaint Case No. 09 of 2021, Permila Sapkota Vs. Local Bodies

Complaint has been received from Ms. Permila Sapkota through email on 10/10/2021 wherein she has stated that during the time of Covid-19 Local Bodies of her locality made her to quarantine for 17 days for testing.

Further, her mother was also tested positive but she was asymptomatic. On inquiry regarding quarantine for asymptomatic from the State Helpline number for Covid-19, it was informed that the period of quarantine is only for 7 to 11 days.

The case has been registered as Complaint Case no. 09 of 2021.

Matter is pending disposal.

3. Complaint Case no. 03 of 2023 Rakesh Gurung Vs. S.P East

The Commission received a complaint dated 22/06/2023 from Mr. Rakesh Gurung through email stating that he is a person with disability (PWD) and was initially appointed as Lower Divisional Clerk through an open competitive examination in the year 1997. Presently, he is working as Upper Divisional Clerk in the Urban Development Department. The promotion from Upper Divisional Clerk to Head Assistant has been denied to him in violation of the provisions of the Right of Persons with Disability Act and in violation of the pronouncement of Hon'ble Supreme and the High Court.

The case has been registered as Complaint Case No. 03 of 2023.

The case is pending till date.

4. Complaint Case No. 04 of 2023 Rajesh Darnal Vs. S.P Pakyong.

The Commission is in receipt of an email dated 30th September, 2023 from a person named Rajesh Darnal, wherein he has stated that he is a resident of Rangpo, East Sikkim and he wants to end his life because his loan is more than his income. He also stated that his son is under medical treatment for his mental health condition since 2021 in Manipal Hospital.

The case has been registered as Complaint Case no. 04 of 2023. The case is pending till date.

5. Complaint Case No. 05 of 2023 Ajay Gurung Vs. S.P Pakyong.

The Commission received a complaint from Mr. Ajay Gurung and Ms. Mamta Gurung of Linkey, Parkha GPU, Pakyong District on 09/10/2023 stating that they got married on 4th September, 2023 at Pachykhani Shivalaya Mandir but their marriage has not been accepted by the Gurung Community and they prepared a documents against them and wanted to throw them out of the Gurung Community. They also submitted that their marriage is legal and as per the tradition of the Gurung Community.

The Commission registered the case as Complaint Case No. 05 of 2023. The case is pending till date.

6. In the matter of Sujoy Pradhan (filed on 20.08.2024)

The Commission also received a complaint pertaining to Cybercrime wherein it is stated that there has been an invasion of privacy through hacking.

The Commission directed the complainant to approach the appropriate forum for redressal of his complaint.

The matter is closed.

7. In the matter of Kalpana Mukherjee (filed on 27.09.2024)

An Email received on 27th September, 2024 from Kalpana Mukherjee in which she has complained about the Company named Aishwarya Healthcare, Sikkim at Samardung where she was working. In her complaint, she has stated that she has been going through torture from her seniors Mr. Rupesh (HR) and Site QA Head Mr. Satendra Kumar Dubey who are creating unprofessional, disgraceful attitude towards her and forcing her to resign or get terminated which they will ensure by using their power.

The complaint is under process.
